National Volunteer Recognition Month

We can never thank our volunteers enough for their active involvement in the literacy community. This includes class tutors or aids, instructors, childcare workers, special event volunteers, board members, and the myriad of other people who gladly give of their time and talents for the sake of adult education.

Volunteering has become a meaningful activity for people of all ages — from adolescents to retirees. Studies have proven the positive rewards of community service and other selfless activities. Some of the recognized benefits of volunteering include: selfsatisfaction, altruism, relaxation, socialization, status or reward, career opportunities, community improvement, and potential learning or acquisition of new skills. In addition to the personal benefits volunteers experience we also recognize the direct benefits for the receivers of volunteer efforts. Whatever reason volunteers initially choose to get involved, it is clear that they often stay because of the community environment that forms.

Another way to encourage volunteer retention is through ongoing recognizing of their efforts. You can recognize your volunteers through birthday cards, volunteer banquets, annual awards, thoughtful gifts at the end of sessions, written thank you letters, take and post pictures of your volunteers, create a volunteer of the month program, and take time to have conversations with your volunteers. Volunteers need to feel valued and that their work is valuable.

Annually, the Tarrant Literacy Coalition hosts an event that is equally challenging, competitive, and entertaining for spellers and spectators alike. 
