On March 6th, Riverside Middle School and the Rotary Club of Fort Worth partnered for a day of service around the community. Mr. Adams' 8th grade class went to the White Settlement ISD Family Resource Center, where ESL and GED classes meet. The students created motivating posters, encouraging cards, and performed some labor intensive building beautification projects—including removing locker doors to create wall sized display areas.

For many of the students, this was their first experience doing volunteer work. To further help them understand the value of volunteering, the students were asked to write essays about the lessons they learned through service. Their teacher graciously shared the students' essays with us so that we could see first hand what they learned from their experience with service above self.



Insights from the 8th graders:

- "The little things in life are what I believe make the biggest difference. At the end of the day we can all say we did a good deed and impacted someone's life."
- "You need to know that there are other people who need to be heard too. Listening to what they're saying will help them too. It would be cool if other school's got to do this too, because if you spread the positive it will come back!"
- "The moral I learned after that day was that it's what you know that will determine how far you'll go. Also, education is the key to every door and leads you to more."
- "I did it because it impacted other lives and it encouraged them to never give up on themselves. After I was finished working I felt good for myself because I knew that I impacted lots of lives and I knew I wasn't going to be paid. I know I effected people's lives by encouraging them to never give up and to thank the teachers and volunteers."

Top 5 Best Ways to End the Semester

Have you found yourself anxiously looking up at the calendar with summer break looming, leaving you with only a few more class meetings? What will you do with those last precious sessions?

I emailed several adult education programs asking about their end of semester practices. Here is a top five list I have created to share some of the traditions and common ideas that were expressed. Maybe you will be inspired to start a new tradition after hearing about what others are doing.

Top 5 Best Ways to End the Semester:

5. Make a Portfolio—Give your students a folder with all their work from the semester/year in chronological order.

- **4. Evaluate**—Have every student fill out a course evaluation form including what they learned that semester, favorite activity, least favorite activity/topic, and if they will be coming back to class in the fall.
- 3. Assess—Give an assessment like the TABE or post-test to every student to measure their learning pro-

- Celebrate!—Consider inviting your students' families to recognize the achievements of your students through performances, certificates, food, and prizes.

Reimbursement amounts are:

- Up to \$675 of allowable expenses for one (1) or two (2) attendees from the same program.
- Up to \$1,200 of allowable expenses for three (3) or more attendees from the same program.
